WHEREAS, the Placer County Transportation Planning Agency has been designated by the Secretary of the State of California, Business and Transportation Agency, as the transportation planning agency for Placer County excluding that portion of the County in the Lake Tahoe Basin, pursuant to the provisions of the Transportation Development Act of 1971, Chapter 1400, Statutes of 1971; and Chapters 161 and 1002, Statutes of 1990; and Chapters 321 and 322, Statutes of 1982; and

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Placer County Transportation Planning Agency, under the provisions of the Act, to review transportation claims and to make allocations of money from the State Transit Assistance Fund based on the claims; and

WHEREAS, the Auditor of each county is required to pay monies in the fund to the claimants pursuant to allocation instructions received from the Placer County Transportation Planning Agency; and

WHEREAS, the Placer County Transportation Planning Agency has reviewed the claim for funds established to be available in the State Transit Assistance fund of Placer County and has made the following findings and allocations:

- 1. The claimant's proposed expenditures are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan.
- 2. The level of passenger fares and charges is sufficient to enable the operator or transit service claimant to meet the fare revenue requirements of Public Utilities Code Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.4, 99268.5, and 99268.9, as they may be applicable to the claimant.
- 3. The claimant is making full use of federal funds available under the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended.
- 4. The sum of the claimant's allocations from the State Transit Assistance Fund and from the Local Transportation Fund does not exceed the amount the claimant is eligible to receive during the fiscal year.
- 5. Priority consideration has been given to claims to offset reductions in federal operating assistance and the unanticipated increase in the cost of fuel, to enhance existing public transportation services, and to meet high priority regional, countywide, or areawide public transportation needs.
- 6. The regional entity may allocate funds to an operator for the purposes specified in Section 6730 only if, in the resolution allocating the funds, it also finds the following:
 - a) The operator has made a reasonable effort to implement the productivity improvements recommended pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 99244. This finding shall make specific reference to the improvements recommended and to the efforts made by the operator to implement them.
 - b) For an allocation made to an operator for its operating cost, the operator is not precluded by any contract entered into on or after June 28, 1979, from employment of part-time drivers or from contracting with common carriers of persons operating under a franchise or license.
 - c) A certification by the Department of the California Highway Patrol verifying that the operator is in compliance with Section 1808.1 of the Vehicle Code, as required in Public Utilities Code Section 99251. The certification shall have been completed within the last 13 months, prior to filing claims.
 - d) The operator is in compliance with the eligibility requirements of Public Utilities Code Section 99314.6.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Agency hereby approves the request for State Transit Assistance Funds for FY 2020/2021 in the amount of \$65,799 for community transit services (section 6731.1).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that allocation instructions are hereby approved for the County Auditor is to pay the claimants in accordance with the above allocations.

ACTION REQUESTED

Staff Recommendation

- 1. Conduct a public hearing to obtain input on the City of Auburn General Plan Draft Safety Element and its consistency with the Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP).
- 2. Find that the City of Auburn General Plan Draft Safety Element is conditionally consistent with the Placer County ALUCP subject to the condition that the Draft Safety Element be updated to include the recommended goal and policies pertaining to airport safety hazards as shown in Attachment 1.

BACKGROUND

Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC)

PCTPA serves as the ALUC for Placer County's public use airports. ALUC's protect public health, safety, and welfare by: (1) ensuring orderly expansion of airports; and (2) promoting compatibility between airports and surrounding land uses. ALUC's achieve this by: (1) adopting an ALUCP; and (2) reviewing plans, regulations, and other actions of local agencies and airport operators for consistency with the plan.

Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP)

State law requires the preparation of an ALUCP for public airports, including the Auburn Municipal Airport. Each ALUCP establishes land use compatibility criteria and zones based on airspace protection, noise, overflight, and safety provisions. It also establishes the types of actions subject to ALUC review.

Local plans, including the City's General Plan, that overlap the Airport Influence Area defined by the ALUCP are required by State law to ensure that the policies in place for the affected area are consistent with the ALUCP. This helps ensure the safety of those in the area as well as the safe operation of the airport itself.

State General Plan Guidelines

State law requires a jurisdiction's General Plan to address seven mandated elements. The list of mandatory elements includes the Safety Element. The goal of the Safety Element is to reduce the potential short and long-term risk of death, injuries, property damage, and economic and social dislocation resulting from fires, floods, droughts, earthquakes, landslides, climate change, and other

hazards. Other locally relevant safety issues, such as airport land use, emergency response, hazardous materials spills, and crime reduction, may also be included in the Safety Element.

Proposed Action

The City of Auburn is currently in the process of updating its Safety Element. This effort is being developed concurrently with the Draft Housing Element 2021-2029. Updates to the Safety Element will meet the requirements of State law as updated by recent legislation.

Public Notice

ALUC review requires notice be provided to the public ten days prior to the hearing. A public hearing notice was published in the Auburn Journal on November 18, 2020. Notice was also posted on PCTPA's website and emailed to airport, civic, and community stakeholders.

DISCUSSION

Staff Recommendation

Staff reviewed the City's Draft Safety Element to ensure it contained the following information:

- Reference to the ALUCP;
- Compliance with ALUCP policies and procedures for development, including airport plans, within the Airport Influence Area;
- Inclusion of a project referral policy or program to the ALUC;
- Inclusion of policy requiring compliance with Federal Aviation Administration Part 77 of the Federal Aviation Regulations (i.e., objects affecting navigable airspace); and
- Discussion of safety impacts related to airport operations.

The Draft Safety Element discusses airport safety hazards; however, this discussion is limited. There are currently no policies proposed to address airport safety hazards. Staff recommends that a goal and policies to address airport safety hazards be included in the Draft Safety Element as shown in Attachment 1. Staff reviewed these recommendations with City staff and their consultant team on November 10th. There were no objections to updating the Draft Safety Element to reflect the recommended goal and policies.

It is important to emphasize that a General Plan's Safety Element directly relates to the Land Use Element as development plans must adequately account for public safety considerations and increased hazard risk. The Draft Safety Element currently identifies hazards and by including the staff recommended policies these will help guide City decisions related to future zoning, subdivisions, and entitlement permits within the Airport Influence Area.

Staff recommends that the Draft Safety Element be found conditionally consistent with the Placer County ALUCP subject to the condition that the Draft Safety Element be updated to include the recommended goal and policies pertaining to airport safety hazards as shown in Attachment 1. The TAC concurs with the staff recommendation.

City of Auburn Draft Safety Element

ALUC Recommendations

GOALS AND POLICIES

Airport Hazards

Airport safety hazards include hazards to aircraft and hazards posed by aircraft to people and property on the ground. Airport safety hazards can be reduced primarily by avoiding incompatible land uses. Specific areas of concern are called safety zones because they are established to protect public safety. Airport safety hazards are fully identified and analyzed in the Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP). Land use restrictions in these safety zones are also defined in the ALUCP.

Goal

To minimize the exposure of the public to airport safety hazards through land use controls and policies for property in the vicinity of Auburn Municipal Airport; and to limit urban encroachment around Auburn Municipal Airport in order to preserve the safety of flight operations and the continued viability of Auburn Municipal Airport.

Policies

Policies in this section are designed to minimize public exposure to risks associated with airport operations and to minimize the siting of land uses near Auburn Municipal Airport that might interfere with airport operations. Related policies are included in Land Use and Noise Elements.

- **S-1 Land Use Compatibility.** Ensure that land use decisions within the Auburn Municipal Airport Influence Area are consistent with the ALUCP.
- **S-2 Airport Development Plans.** Require future airport development plans to be compatible with existing and planned land uses that surround Auburn Municipal Airport.
- **S-3 Hazardous Obstructions.** Ensure that development, including public infrastructure projects, located within Auburn Municipal Airport's safety zones, or known flight patterns, complies with Part 77 of the Federal Aviation Administration regulations (objects affecting navigable airspace).

Implementation Programs

The City of Auburn shall refer to the Placer County Airport Land Use Commission for review projects within the Auburn Municipal Airport Influence Area requiring amendments of the General Plan, zoning text amendments, building code amendments, airport development plans, rezoning applications, and other discretionary entitlements for consistency with the ALUCP.

DISCUSSION

Under Article II, Section 2.1 of the PCTPA Bylaws, the annual appointments of Chair and Vice Chair take effect each January. The Bylaws also specify the following rotation schedule:

- City of Auburn
- City of Colfax
- Placer County
- City of Lincoln
- Town of Loomis
- Placer County
- City of Rocklin
- City of Roseville
- Placer County

At the December 5, 2018 PCTPA meeting, pursuant to past practice where the incoming scheduled Chair is new to the Board or unable to serve as Chair, the Board took action to have the scheduled jurisdictions trade places and assigned Placer County as Chair and City of Colfax as Vice-Chair in 2019. To realign the rotation schedule, the City of Colfax, having served as Vice Chair in 2019, served as Chair in 2020 and the City of Lincoln served as Vice Chair. Placer County, having served as Chair in 2019 fell back into the rotation schedule.

Given the rotation schedule is back on track, we recommend the Board designate the Board Member representing the City of Lincoln to serve as Chair and the Board Member representing the Town of Loomis to serve as Vice Chair for the 2021 calendar year.

SUBJECT: <u>IN PERSON BOARD MEETINGS IN JANUARY 2021</u>

ACTION REQUESTED

That the Board return to in-person meetings in January 2021 similar to other jurisdictions in Placer County and continue to take public comment in-person or via teleconference.

BACKGROUND

The Board has been meeting via video teleconference since March 2020 to comply with the state requirements for meetings of local jurisdictions during to the COVID-19 crisis. Placer City Councils and the Board of Supervisors have moved back to in-person meetings with elected officials and the public. Public testimony of those bodies is being done in a combination of inperson and teleconference format which is unique to each jurisdiction.

DISCUSSION

Unlike the City Councils and the Board of Supervisors, the PCTPA Board is comprised of nine (9) members. All the chambers of every entity in the County were designed for seating five (5) elected/appointed officials. We can return to the Domes but would have to utilize staff seating areas for the full Board to maintain social distancing per CDC guidelines. Staff would speak from the center podium. Placer County IT staff is prepared to make this work if the Board choses to return to in-person meetings.

Governor's Executive Order N-29-20 for Brown Act compliance and public meetings during the COVID-19 crisis still does not appear to be changing. There is no indication that it will be modified from a regulatory standpoint. The SACOG Board will continue to meet electronically until mid-2021 due to their even larger size.

A hybrid approach for Board member attendance is feasible but could be awkward. Staff recommends that the Board decide in meeting entirely in-person or entirely via teleconference and reserve attending via teleconference only for unusual circumstances. There may be situations where this teleconference is the best option either for staff or Board Members due to unique circumstances presented by COVID-19 precautions.

Public comment may be enhanced by allowing for teleconference access. Staff recommends that we continue this hybrid approach for public comment and evaluate its effectiveness at the end of the fiscal year.

This meeting was conducted via video conference call.

SB 1 Grant Funding

Luke McNeel-Caird shared that CTC staff is recommending approval of \$130 million in SB 1 Grant funding under the Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP) and Solutions for Congested Corridors Program (TCEP). Luke added that the partnerships 14 agencies including Caltrans, Capitol Corridor, SACOG, and local agencies in Placer and Sacramento Counties, contributed to the success of these applications. SCCP application for the Placer-Sacramento Gateway Plan provides for \$67 million in funding for six projects including the South Placer County Transit Project, the Dry Creek Greenway trail, and the I-80 eastbound auxiliary lane between Highway 65 and Rocklin Road. The \$63 million in TCEP includes funding for the I-80 5th Lane on westbound I-80 between Douglas Boulevard and Riverside Avenue. Luke congratulated Kathleen Hanley and David Melko for their hard work on these applications.

Public Hearing: ALUC Consistency Review – Auburn Draft Safety Element

David Melko explained that an ALUC review is required to determine if the City of Auburn General Plan Draft Safety Element is consistent with the Placer County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP). David explained that in reviewing the City's Draft Safety Element, airport safety hazards were identified, however, there were no policies included to address these hazards. As such, staff developed a set of goals and policies pertaining to airport safety hazards. Staff is recommending that the ALUC find the Draft Safety Element to be conditionally consistent with the ALUCP subject to the condition that the Draft Safety Element be updated to include the recommended goal and policies pertaining to airport safety hazards. The City of Auburn staff had no objection to this, and the TAC concurred with this recommendation.

LTF Ped / Bike Allocation

Aaron Hoyt provided the LTF pedestrian / bicycle five-year allocation – FY 2020/21 – 2024/25. Aaron explained that since the late in 1980's we've maintained a 25% for discretionary funding to provide agencies additional funding in unique situations and make up shortfalls in revenue. The remainder is allocated by population. Aaron asked if we want to continue the discretionary funding or perhaps reallocate these discretionary funds to the jurisdictions. After some discussion, the TAC agreed to delay taking the ped / bike allocation to the Board for approval until at least March when a mid-year status update on LTF is discussed. PCTPA staff will bring a few discretionary funding options back to the TAC.

Caltrans Report from Planning Staff

Fallon Cox reported that rehabilitation and improvements on four bridges on I-80 will take place in eastern Placer County. The project costs total \$57 million and all will include ADA ramps. Fallon also reported that Caltrans in cooperation with the City of Roseville has been awarded funding for the Atlantic / Eureka I-80 westbound on-ramp improvement project and construction will begin soon.

Other Issues / Upcoming Deadlines

- a) Traffic Monitoring: Aaron Hoyt shared travel trends during COVID noting that VMT went down 65% in the SACOG region. The VMT in Placer County, however, has only gone down 25% according to data from REPLICA, a big data company. He showed traffic comparison on SR 65 and I-80 for the past year and noted that traffic volumes are leveling out to pre-COVID volumes. Hoyt will continue to monitor and update the TAC.
- b) Caltrans and Placer County Coordination Meeting: January 21st 1:00 3:00 pm Luke McNeel-Caird encouraged representatives from each jurisdiction to participate in this meeting and share information on their transportation projects.

2020 Remaining Schedule

The House is in recess until Nov. 16 and the Senate subject to the call of the chair. Because of the expiration date for the Continuing Resolution (CR), there will be a lame duck session, probably lasting until the December holidays. The legislative agenda for the session will depend, to a great extent, on the results of the election, not only regarding the presidency but control of the Senate. Because this is the end of the second session, any bills that don't become law by the time of adjournment "die" and will have to start over in the new year/new Congress.

Lame Duck Session

What happens with current legislation in the lame duck session is all tied to the election. If there is no change – the President wins the election and the Republicans hold the Senate - then the lame duck session will likely be a scramble to pass pending legislation. If Biden wins and the Senate flips to a Democrat majority, then it is likely that most pending bills will spill over (start again) in the new Congress to improve the outcome for Democrats. If it is a hybrid (Trump Admin/Democrat Senate or Biden Admin/Republican Senate), then it's anyone's guess what will happen in the lame duck session.

FY21 Continuing Resolution

A CR was passed to continue funding the government at FY20 levels until December 11. Most programs are funded at the FY20 levels at a prorated basis (there is increased funding for farmers because of COVID). A one-year extension of the FAST Act is also included (\$47.1B for highways, \$12.3B for transit, and \$14B for airports). The CR was needed because the House has passed all their appropriation bills, but the Senate has not passed any.

House FY21 Transportation Appropriations Bill

The FY21 Transportation Appropriations bill was approved by the full House and bus programs received a significant plus-up of \$499 million. This is the highest plus-up we have ever secured

in either a House or Senate Appropriations bill. In addition, the funds are 100% federal, so no local match would be required, which is especially important in these challenging times. If this plus-up is maintained in a final bill, total 5339 funding for FY21 would be \$1.307 billion.

The Breakdown

Under the \$510 million plus-up account, dubbed the Transit Infrastructure Grant Program:

- The 5339b competitive grant program received an additional \$374 million, funds are 100% federal (no local match requirement) and minimum grant awards are set at \$1 million. Total 5339b funding for FY21 would be \$663 million if these plus-up funds are maintained.
- The 5339c low and no emissions program received an additional \$125 million, funds are 100% federal and minimum grant awards are set at \$1.25 million. Total 5339c funding for FY21 would be \$180 million.
- The remaining \$11 million of the total \$510 million in the Transit Infrastructure Grant Program went to the passenger ferry program (\$10 million) and a pilot program for demand response software (\$1 million).

Senate FY21 Appropriations Bills

No action to date.

Infrastructure (The Congress)

Given that the FAST Act is extended in the FY21 Continuing Resolution for one year until Sept. 30, 2021, it is unlikely that infrastructure will happen in the lame duck session as it was tied to the FAST Act reauthorization. The highway bill is expected to be considered in the springtime. In addition to the FAST Act, the House Democrats' mega-infrastructure bill includes \$40B for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund, \$500M for recycled water projects under the WIIN Act, a de-authorization process for inactive Title XVI projects, and \$600M for the Alternative Water Source Program. On the Senate side, the only committee to act so far on its portion of a highway bill (the Environment and Public Works committee) has not solicited input from the other committees of jurisdiction, and no bill has gone to the Floor. While there continues to be interest by all in doing an infrastructure bill, though the views on what would be in the bill differ between Republicans and Democrats, notwithstanding the action on the FAST Act in the CR, doing infrastructure in the lame duck session would have been challenging at best.

Infrastructure (The White House)

To review, the President's FY21 Budget has two major infrastructure components. The first is a \$810 billion, 10-year reauthorization of surface transportation programs. The second is a \$190 billion in investments across a range of infrastructure, as follows:

- \$60 Billion for a new Building Infrastructure Great grants program: This "megaprojects" program will focus on delivery of such projects across a range of sectors: surface transportation road, bridge, rail, transit, pipeline, landside port, and intermodal connection capital investments; lock, dam, and canal investments; drinking water and waste treatment capital investments; and energy and broadband capital investments.
- \$50 billion for a new Moving America's Freight Safely and Efficiently program. This program will support projects with significant economic, mobility, and safety benefits on our strategic highway, rail, port, and waterway freight networks.
- \$35 billion for a new Bridge Rebuilding program. This program will make targeted investments in critical bridge infrastructure to restore them to good condition. \$12 billion will be provided for "off- system" bridges allocated via formula, and \$23 billion will be provided for larger bridges via a competitive process.
- \$25 billion for a new Revitalizing Rural America program. This program focuses on the needs and contributions to our economy made by rural communities and helps them deliver broadband, transportation, water and other infrastructure projects.
- \$20 billion for a Transit State of Good Repair Sprint program. The program will focus exclusively on rehabilitating existing transit assets (no new capacity projects).
- **\$6.5** billion for a Public Lands Infrastructure Fund. This program would address the deferred maintenance backlog in our national parks, forests, wildlife refuges and other public lands, along with Bureau of Indian Education.

Infrastructure (Biden \$2T Infrastructure Plan: Some Highlights)

- Update roads, bridges and electric grids;
- Expand access to broadband;
- Upgrade 4 million buildings and weatherize 2 million homes over four years by providing homeowners with direct cash rebates and low-cost financing;
- Provide cities with high-quality, zero-emissions public transportation options, such as light rail networks;
- Achieve a carbon pollution-free power sector by 2035;
- Enable the creation of 1.5 million sustainable homes and housing units;
- Provide increased funding to meet long overdue clean and safe drinking water needs;
- Create union jobs in the construction industry;
- Create 1 million jobs in the auto industry and increase the demand for American-made, American-sourced clean vehicles;
- Provide consumers with rebates for trading in old, less-efficient vehicles for newer America-made vehicles;
- Construct 500,000 electric vehicle charging stations;
- Require all new American-built buses be zero-emissions by 2030; and,
- Establish new fuel economy standards to reduce pollution.

Senate Highway Bill

To review, the EPW bipartisan bill would authorize \$287 billion in highway spending, 90-percent of which would be distributed to the states by formula. The bill also features a title on climate change, which would authorize \$10.8 billion for various programs addressing resiliency and other climate issues over the next five fiscal years. That includes \$1 billion for electric, hydrogen, and natural gas vehicle charging and fueling stations. It would also provide billions for programs aimed at curbing emissions and reducing congestion and truck idling. The legislation would also streamline infrastructure permitting and set a two-year target for environmental reviews. Lastly, the bill would authorize \$12.5 million per year to fund state and reginal pilot testing of user-based alternative revenue mechanisms to the gas tax.

House Highway Bill

The bill, as reported by the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, <u>Investing in a New Vision for the Environment and Surface Transportation</u> or INVEST in America Act provides \$494 billion in total funding from FY21 to FY25 for highway, highway safety, transit, and passenger rail programs, as follows: \$319 billion for the Federal-aid highway program under the Federal Highway Administration.; \$105 billion for transit programs under the Federal Transit Administration; \$4.6 billion for highway safety programs under the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration; \$5.3 billion for motor carrier safety programs under the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration; and, \$60 billion for passenger rail programs under the Federal Railroad Administration and Amtrak. For the first year of the proposed bill, \$83.1 billion is provided essentially as an extension of the FAST Act to ensure that states, cities, tribes, territories, and transit agencies can continue to administer programs, advance projects, and preserve jobs in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Committees: Finance Increases from \$15 billion to \$20.8 billion the national limitation on the amount of tax-exempt highway or surface freight transfer facility bonds.

H.R.180 — 116th Congress (2019-2020)

Build America Act of 2019

Sponsor: Rep. Hastings, Alcee L. [D-FL-20] (Introduced 01/03/2019) Cosponsors: (7, now 12) Committees: Transportation and Infrastructure and Ways and Means Directs the Department of Transportation (DOT) to carry out a national infrastructure investment grant program for capital investments in surface transportation infrastructure. Projects eligible for funding under the program include, at a minimum, highway and bridge projects, public transportation projects, passenger and freight rail transportation projects, and port infrastructure investments. In distributing grants under the program, DOT shall ensure an equitable geographic distribution of funds, an appropriate balance in addressing the needs of urban and rural areas, and investment in a variety of transportation modes. At least 20% of grant funds must be set aside for projects in rural areas. The bill amends the Internal Revenue Code to: (1) establish a National Infrastructure Investment Trust Fund, and (2) increase the tax on gasoline other than aviation gasoline and on diesel fuel or kerosene.

S.146 — 116th Congress (2019-2020)

Move America Act of 2019

Sponsor: Sen. Hoeven, John [R-ND] (Introduced 01/16/2019) Cosponsors: (1)

Committees: Finance Allows tax exempt Move America bonds and Move America tax credits to be used for certain infrastructure projects. A Move America bond is treated as a tax-exempt private facility bond with certain exceptions. At least 95% of the net proceeds from the issuance of the bond must be used for infrastructure projects. The bill specifies exceptions and modifications to existing rules for bonds regarding land acquisition, government ownership, rehabilitation expenditures, and the alternative minimum tax. The bonds are subject to a volume cap equal to 50% of a state's current private activity bond volume cap. States may exchange all or a portion of the volume cap for Move America tax credits to be allocated to taxpayers. The credits include (1) an equity credit for a portion of the basis of each qualified facility; and (2) an infrastructure fund credit for investments in qualified infrastructure funds, including a state infrastructure bank, a water pollution control revolving fund, or a drinking water treatment revolving loan fund.

RAPID Act

Sponsor: Sen. Cornyn, John [R-TX] (Introduced 02/06/2019) Cosponsors: (1)

Committees: Environment and Public Works This bill revises the transportation infrastructure finance and innovation (TIFIA) program to (1) require program applicants to obtain investment grade ratings from at least two credit rating agencies, unless the federal credit instrument is less than \$150 million (currently, less than \$75 million), in which case one rating will suffice; (2) require the Department of Transportation (DOT) to implement an expedited decision timeline for

public agency borrowers seeking secured loans; and (3) require DOT to publish status reports on program applications on the TIFIA website.

S.403 — 116th Congress (2019-2020)

IMAGINE Act

Sponsor: <u>Sen. Whitehouse</u>, <u>Sheldon [D-RI]</u> (Introduced 02/07/2019) Cosponsors: (<u>5</u>, now 7) Committees: Environment and Public Works. Encourages the use of innovative construction materials and techniques to accelerate the deployment, extend the service life, improve the performance, and reduce the cost of domestic transportation and water infrastructure projects.

<u>H.R.228</u> — 116th Congress (2019-2020)

Increase Transportation Alternatives Investment Act of 2019

Sponsor: Rep. Velazquez, Nydia M. [D-NY-7] (Introduced

01/03/2019) Cosponsors: (2) Committees: Transportation and Infrastructure Directs the Department of Transportation (DOT) to ensure that states give preference under the Surface Transportation Block Grant Program to eligible projects that (1) are located in areas that are undergoing extensive repair or reconstruction of transportation infrastructure, including federal-aid highways, federally owned roads open for public travel, passenger rail facilities, and public transportation facilities; and (2) will provide transportation alternatives related to the closure of transportation infrastructure in such areas. DOT shall (1) carry out a competitive grant program to support community efforts to invest in transportation alternatives; and (2) give preference in awarding grants to projects located in such areas. Entities eligible for grants include state and local governments, metropolitan planning organizations, and rural planning organizations.

H.R.880 — 116th Congress (2019-2020)

Surface Transportation Investment Act of 2019

Sponsor: Rep. Brownley, Julia [D-CA-26] (Introduced 01/30/2019) Cosponsors: (1)

Committees: Ways and Means and Transportation and Infrastructure. This bill limits or repeals certain tax benefits for major integrated oil companies, including (1) the foreign tax credit for companies that are dual capacity taxpayers, (2) the tax deduction for intangible drilling and development costs, (3) the percentage depletion allowance for oil and gas wells, and (4) the tax deduction for qualified tertiary injectant expenses.

The bill modifies the definition of "major integrated oil company" to include certain successors in interest that control more than 50% of the crude oil production or natural gas production of the company. The bill establishes a Transportation Block Grant Fund and appropriates to the fund amounts equal to the increase in revenues as a result of this bill. The funds must be used for making grants under the Surface Transportation Block Grant Program.

Committee: Environment and Public Works. To improve the processes by which environmental documents are prepared and permits and applications are processed and regulated by Federal departments and agencies, and for other purposes.

H.R.3134 — 116th Congress (2019-2020 To direct the Secretary of Transportation to assist

States to rehabilitate or replace certain bridges, and for other purposes. Sponsor: Rep. Langevin, James R. [D-RI-2] (Introduced 06/05/2019) Cosponsors: (2) Committee: Transportation and Infrastructure. To direct the Secretary of Transportation to assist States to rehabilitate or replace certain bridges, and for other purposes.
